We're looking for a date to show the film debut of "Brujo" which Glenn Mack and his team made two summers ago ~ actually filmed in Washington. George has offered his lovely poetry hike. Then there are many more visitors, regular friends and members who continue to treasure our time together in Washington. We've had the pleasure of having been lifted musically by our various accompanists including this Sunday by Catherin Orr and Raymond Malone. Folks are enjoying our guests in the pulpit and seemed to have especially resonated with the message on Universalism and Real Religion from Richard Trudeau last month.

So a lot is happening. It feels to me that there is momentum. In consultation with the Board, we've decided to plan one more gathering possibly on a weekend in September. S2S has organized a Seminarians Interfaith Seminar (SIS) program for emerging religious leaders to provide them with experience and training in interfaith work. Specifically ten seminarians will be attending the convention and also meetíng for discussion and training on interfaith work during the weekend. I will be attending and will have the honor of serving as a mentor for the ten seminarians in this endeavor. I'm honored and grateful to have this opportunity. So, l'm sorry to miss the service and wanted to let You know why. From the convention in Detroit, I'll be thinking of all of You in Washington.

Holiness and the Feminine Spirit: The Art of Janet McKenzie - the Waitsfield United Church of Christ will exhibit the paintings of Vermont artist, Janet McKenzie, during the Vermont Festival of the Arts in August. This summer will be our second annual Art Exhibit in collaboration with The Festival of the Arts event in the valley. We are enormously privileged to be hosting Janet McKenzie and her beautiful paintings. Holiness and the Feminine Spirit is an exhibit of fifteen paintings modeled on two groups (women and people of color) that have been underrepresented in traditional Christian imagery. Her painting Jesus of the People will be on view, offering a rare opportunity to see the original painting. Selected First Place Winner of the National Catholic Reporter's global competition for an image of Christ for the new millennium, the painting invariably generates conversation. Janet's paintings reflect her hope for greater love among all of us, for seeing with honest eyes, having an open heart, and an open mind. She strives to create art that celebrates our inherent similarities rather than our differences. We're hosting some book discussions this summer on titles that some of us have been reading and are eager to talk with others about including.

## Date To Be Announced, "Cold Mountain" by Charles Frazier Potluck at 5:30,

 Book discussion at 6:30. "Cold Mountain, is a 1997 historical novel which won the U.S. National Book Award for Fiction. It tells the story of W. P. Inman, a wounded deserter from the Confederate army near the end of the American Civil War who walks for months to return to Ada Monroe, the love of his life; the story shares several similarities with Homer's The Odyssey." The novel, interestingly enough, also has Universalist connections! Rev. M'ellen learned about the Universalist connections while she attended the Universalist Convocation in Cincinnati this Spring. In real life, there is a Universalist Inman Chapel in North Carolina where Frazier's ancestors were members. One of the main characters, Ada, is the daughter of a minister. If You read the text with a theological eye, You can tell that they are Universalist, although Frazier doesn't' spell that out. There is a fascinating article in the Universalist Herald that delves into the Universalist heritage of this inspiring novel.
